MR. GLYNN R. CLARK

EDUCATIONAL COUNSELOR

Mr. Glynn R. Clark, new to Southwest this term, has come to serve us as educational counselor. Here, in his own words, is his explanation of his duties: "Large classes and vast numbers of pupils make it impossible for teachers and principals to spend as much time with the individual pupil as they would like. Counselors are provided to help pupils individually to solve their school or personal problems. Interest is taken in the educational program of students to help them get the greatest possible benefit from high school. Courses of study, life work plans, and personal relationships are considered.

"A counselor provides teachers and pupils with information with which they can better handle their educational problems. The administration of St. Louis schools is particularly interested in developing the bright students to their fullest capacity. In fact the idea behind counselling is to assist each pupil to work up to his capacity and thereby profit most from his education."
